*We do not ship any device, component, part, combination of parts, attachment, or accessory that increases the rate of fire of any firearm, including but not limited to bump stocks, trigger cranks, and binary trigger systems.*

## **Magazines**

Magazines are limited to ten (10) rounds. This includes any conversion kit, part, or combination of parts from which a device can be assembled. No magazine extensions / extenders.

Exemptions:

- A. An ammunition-feeding device that has been permanently altered so that it cannot accommodate more than 10 rounds of ammunition;
- B. A .22 caliber tubular ammunition-feeding device; or
- C. A tubular magazine that is contained in a lever-action firearm.

Any branch of the armed forces of the United States or the state of Washington, or to a law enforcement agency in this state for use by that agency or its employees for law enforcement purposes.

## **Handguns**

### **Handguns:**

To purchase a handgun in the state of Washington, a person must be minimum age 21, a resident of the state, and must possess a valid concealed pistol license. Additionally, the transferring dealer must be notified in writing by the chief of police or sheriff of a jurisdiction in which the purchaser resides that the purchaser is eligible to possess a pistol under RCW 9.41.040.

## Assault Weapons

Washington State HB 1240

No so called "Assault Weapons" as defined below.

**"Assault weapon" means:**

- i. Any of the following specific firearms regardless of which company produced and manufactured the firearm:

- ii. A semiautomatic rifle that has an overall length of less than 30 inches;
- iii. A conversion kit, part, or combination of parts, from which an assault weapon can be assembled or from which a firearm can be converted into an assault weapon if those parts are in the possession or under the control of the same person or
- iv. A semiautomatic, center fire rifle that has the capacity to accept a detachable magazine and has one or more of the following:
- A. A grip that is independent or detached from the stock that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon. The addition of a fin attaching the grip to the stock does not exempt the grip if it otherwise resembles the grip found on a pistol;

- B. Thumbhole stock;
  - C. Folding or telescoping stock;
  - D. Forward pistol, vertical, angled, or other grip designed for use by the nonfiring hand to improve control;
  - E. Flash suppressor, flash guard, flash eliminator, flash hider, sound suppressor, silencer, or any item designed to reduce the visual or audio signature of the firearm;
  - F. Muzzle brake, recoil compensator, or any item designed to be affixed to the barrel to reduce recoil or muzzle rise;
  - G. Threaded barrel designed to attach a flash suppressor, sound suppressor, muzzle break, or similar item;
  - H. Grenade launcher or flare launcher; or
  - I. A shroud that encircles either all or part of the barrel designed to shield the bearer's hand from heat, except a solid forearm of a stock that covers only the bottom of the barrel;
- v. A semiautomatic, center fire rifle that has a fixed magazine with the capacity to accept more than 10 rounds;
- vi. A semiautomatic pistol that has the capacity to accept a detachable magazine and has one or more of the following:
- A. A threaded barrel, capable of accepting a flash suppressor, forward handgrip, or silencer;
  - B. A second hand grip;
  - C. A shroud that encircles either all or part of the barrel designed to shield the bearer's hand from heat, except a solid forearm of a stock that covers only the bottom of the barrel; or
  - D. The capacity to accept a detachable magazine at some location outside of the pistol grip;
- vii. A semiautomatic shotgun that has any of the following:
- A. A folding or telescoping stock;
  - B. A grip that is independent or detached from the stock that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon. The addition of a fin attaching the grip to the stock does not exempt the grip if it otherwise resembles the grip found on a pistol;
  - C. A thumbhole stock;
  - D. A forward pistol, vertical, angled, or other grip designed for use by the nonfiring hand to improve control;
  - E. A fixed magazine in excess of seven rounds; or
  - F. A revolving cylinder shotgun.
1. *For the purposes of this subsection, "fixed magazine" means an ammunition feeding device contained in, or permanently attached to, a firearm in such a manner that the device cannot be removed without disassembly of the firearm action.*
  2. *"Detachable magazine" means an ammunition feeding device that can be loaded or unloaded while detached from a firearm and readily inserted into a firearm.*
  3. *For purposes of this subsection, "fire control component" means a component necessary for the firearm to initiate, complete, or continue the firing sequence, including any of the following: Hammer, bolt, bolt carrier, breechblock, cylinder, trigger mechanism, firing pin, striker, or slide rails.*
  4. *"Large capacity magazine" means an ammunition feeding device with the capacity to accept more than 10 rounds of ammunition, or any conversion kit, part, or combination of parts, from which such a device can be assembled if those parts are in possession of or under the control of the same person, but shall not be construed to include any of the following:*

- a. *An ammunition feeding device that has been permanently altered so that it cannot accommodate more than 10 rounds of ammunition;*
  - b. *A 22 caliber tube ammunition feeding device; or*
  - c. *A tubular magazine that is contained in a lever-action firearm.*
- viii. NO Binary triggers.
- ix. NO AR, AK, other frames or receivers that when completed would constitute an “Assault Weapon” as defined above.
- x. NO parts that when attached to a semi auto rifle, pistol or shotgun that would cause the firearm to be an “Assault Weapon” as defined above.

## Rifles

### Semi-Automatic Rifles

In Washington, a semi-automatic assault rifle is defined by Initiative Measure 1639 as:

*Any rifle which utilizes a portion of the energy of a firing cartridge to extract the fired cartridge case and chamber the next round, and which requires a separate pull of the trigger to fire each cartridge.*

To purchase semi-automatic rifles as defined above, a person must be a resident of the state and **minimum 21 years of age**. This restriction **does not include** those rifles that are:

1. Antique firearms
2. Any firearm rendered permanently inoperable
3. Any firearm that is manually operated by a bolt, pump, lever, or slide action.

There are **no exceptions** for military or police members under the age of 21, and .22 caliber semi-automatic rimfire or centerfire rifles **are included** within the scope of the regulation.

### Frames and Receivers

No unserialized frames or receivers.

## Black Powder Firearms

### Black Powder Firearms:

All black powder firearms must be transferred via Federal Firearms Licensee (FFL). The only exception allowed is for “antique firearms” as defined in RCW 9.41.010:

1. "Antique firearm" means a firearm or replica of a firearm not designed or redesigned for using rimfire or conventional centerfire ignition with fixed ammunition **and** manufactured in or before 1898, including any matchlock, flintlock, percussion cap, or similar type of ignition system and also any firearm using fixed ammunition manufactured in or before 1898, for which ammunition is no longer manufactured in the United States and is not readily available in the ordinary channels of commercial trade.

Thus all "modern" black powder firearms, even those that are not convertible to rimfire or centerfire, must transfer through an FFL.

Additionally, a person prohibited from possessing a modern firearm is also prohibited from possessing a black powder firearm in Washington.

## Accessories

Magazines over ten (10) rounds are prohibited.
